Keeping it country after Floral dance

Where were you born and where did you grow up?

I was born in Belfast at the Royal...we lived on Floral Gardens (in amongst other red brick houses just to the side of M2 near Cave Hill/Zoo) until I was three years old and then we moved to Formby in Merseyside/Lancashire

Where did you go to school?

Our Lady's Primary/Junior School – Formby, Holy Family High School – Crosby, St Gregory's RC High School – Kenton, London and finally Queen Mary's Sixth Form College – Basingstoke, Hants

What is your earliest memory?

Floral Gardens actually – I can picture playing outside – I think I ate a piece of dried poo and got in trouble (I think I'd worry if my three year old daughter ate something similar – we're on constant 'jobbie' alert here in Leith in Edinburgh – it's everywhere)

What did you want to be when you were a child? Definitely a spaceman...or the screenwriter for Dr Who (when Tom Baker was doctor)

What are the worst and best jobs you have ever had?

Worst job was working in a plastic moulding factory where you just opened a machine, put something inside, closed it, pushed a button and then took it out and put it in a box. I don't remember the other people there being friendly either. Also worked at a box making factory — that might've been even more boring. Best job is what I do now, being a self-employed musician

Who is your most inspiring person?

Argentine jazz pianist and movie score composer Lalo Schifrin. Just for the breadth and depth of his amazing creativity. Anything is possible in music and Mr Schifrin (I've not met him so maybe shouldn't call him Lalo) demonstrated that over and over again

What is your favourite book, film, and band?

My favourite book is Easy Rider's Raging Bulls which takes a look behind the scenes of 60s and 70s 'new Hollywood' movie making – I actually might read that again soon. Film-wise it has to be Ridley Scott's Blade Runner – I've seen it loads of times and it never gets dull. For the band I have so many favourites but will pick Tangerine Dream (it's today's favourite at least) as I've been digging their soundtrack to the film Sorcerer recently

Who would play you in a film of your life?

John Cusack – we're a similar age and from a distance look a bit the same (kind of on a side angle).

Do you have a favourite joke or quote?

I like my Dad's old line (he's from Tyrone and lived and worked in Belfast for a few years after finishing at Queen's University) that I think he picked up working in bands in the clubs around Belfast in the late 60s. He would always introduce one song in each set as "This next one's called 'Please don't sit on the bacon slicer baby, we're getting behind in the orders'"

What is your most treasured possession?

If we're not including my lovely wife (Debs) and two kids (Johnny and Elsie Belle) then it's either my banjo (a 30th birthday present from all my friends) or my signed The Beyond VHS cover. It's on my desk in front of me and has the autographs of director Lucio Fulci, actors David Warbeck and Catriona McColl plus composer Fabio Frizzi on it. A great Italian zombie horror film and one of all time favourite films after Blade Runner

What is your greatest fear?

The eternity of infinite nothingness that awaits me on my death. I guess I won't know about it of course but I hate the fact it'll all just suddenly end – that's why I've got a few songs about living inside a computer. It's one of my hopes to save me from this fate; though the songs manage to point out the downside of that theoretical existence

What are you very good at?

Arranging music and drinking real ale

What are you most proud of

Johnny and Elsie Belle and their wonderful sense of humour and energy. Our kids are amazing (like everyone else's) and me and Debs feel very lucky

What place would you like to visit before you die?

The Arctic maybe – or somewhere quite far north where I could see the Northern Lights and some giant icebergs shear off into the sea

What is the last text message you received?


My mother in law checking if the kids would be alright sleeping there tonight without their soft toys blue bear and doggy (I forgot to take them over there when I dropped EB off this morning)
